Our 45 elementary and secondary schools in the Diocese of Pittsburgh are truly lighting the way. They show students new worlds though language, math, history and the sciences. Whether they are interacting with the student at the next desk or taking donations to the Saint Vincent de Paul Society, our students learn and live the Gospel command to love.

Catholic schools in the Diocese of Pittsburgh are affordable. Almost no one pays the full cost. We offer multiple streams of scholarship funding to help families with tuition. 

## ACCESSIBLE & AFFORDABLE

Financial Aid for Catholic Education is available to you.



ALMOST students' tuition rates are substantially less than the cost per student due to subsidies from the Catholic community.

#### Bishop's Education Fund

The Bishop's Education Fund provides tuition assistance to Catholic families attending Catholic schools within the Diocese of Pittsburgh. The application form requires a signature from the family's parish pastor. Information and application forms are at www.diopitt.org/affordable, which you can access via the QR code below.

#### The Extra Mile Foundation

The Extra Mile Foundation provides support to three urban elementary schools in the Diocese of Pittsburgh. This program also serves children attending other Catholic schools through scholarship support. Over 600 of our pre-K through eighth-grade students receive scholarship support thanks to Extra Mile.

#### ETTC

#### **Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program**

Both Catholic and non-Catholic students are eligible for tuition assistance from the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) programs, which are supported by business owners who opt to divert a portion of their state taxes to the educational institution of their choice. # GOVERNANCE

All Catholic schools affiliated with the Diocese of Pittsburgh operate under the diocesan bishop. He is advised and informed by both clergy and laity on the diocesan staff or who serve on school governing boards. Those boards are under the direct authority of a diocesan body known as the Board of Members, which comprises the bishop, his vicar general and the diocesan chancellor.

The overarching parent corporation for our high schools is Catholic High Schools of the Diocese of Pittsburgh (CHSDOP), whose members are appointed and bylaws approved by the bishop. Beneath the umbrella of CHSDOP, each high school has a board, assisted by ex-officio members from the diocesan staff.

Elementary schools in the diocese are undergoing regionalization. Through regionalization, we have moved from parish governance to oversight by a regional administration and board of directors subject to the reserve powers of the members. The four regions are Pittsburgh City Regional Catholic Elementary Schools (PCRCES), North Hills Regional Catholic Elementary Schools (NHRCES), South Regional Catholic Elementary Schools (SRCES), and Pittsburgh East Regional Catholic Elementary Schools (PERCES).


Not all Catholic schools within the territory of the diocese are operated by the diocese. Private Catholic schools and independent academies within the diocese are owned and operated by a religious congregation or a lay board.





## STELLAR NATIONAL TEST SCORES


The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), or "the nation's report card," is one of the most valid and trusted national measures of student achievement. First administered in 1969, it is the largest nationally representative assessment comparing the progress of students in both public and private schools. Students in grades 4, 8 and 12 are assessed in the areas of reading, math and other subjects every two years. In 2022, Catholic schools outscored public and charter schools in almost every category.






#### **IOWA Assessment 2023**


Academic excellence is a priority for our diocesan schools. Third- through eighth-grade students take the lowa Assessments and consistently score above the national norms. These assessments measure readiness, student achievement and growth, evaluating foundational as well as complex skills.

In the spring of 2023, our students in grades three to eight took the lowa Assessment, which measures student performance and readiness for college or careers. Diocese of Pittsburgh students across all grade levels exceeded the national average by 19-27% in English language arts and by 12-22% in mathematics.

Displayed to the right are "grade equivalent" scores, which show the year and month of school for which a student's skills are typical. For example, a grade equivalent score of 3.8 means that the student's achievement is typical for a child who has completed the eighth month of third grade. Our diocesan school averages exceeded the norms in all subjects at all grade levels.





# Our High Schools





We make it our goal to care for students, families, and faculty before, during, and after school. Each day, we make a commitment to the academic, physical, emotional, and health of the entire Catholic school community here in the Diocese of Pittsburgh.





The Diocese of Pittsburgh has adopted a youth violence prevention program for its schools: Safe2Say Something. This initiative of the Pennsylvania Office of the

Attorney General teaches youth and adults how to recognize warning signs especially via social media - from persons who may be a threat to themselves or others, and to say something before it is too late.
